Sasha Costanza-Chock (she/they/ella/elle) is a nonbinary trans* femme researcher and designer who works to support community-led processes that build shared power, dismantle the matrix of domination, and advance ecological survival. Sasha is known for their work on networked social movements, transformative media organizing, and design justice. Sasha is presently the Head of Research & Sensemaking at OneProject.org and a tenured Associate Professor at Northeastern University's College of Arts, Media, & Design. Sasha is also a Faculty Associate with the Berkman-Klein Center for Internet & Society at Harvard University and a member of the Steering Committee of the Design Justice Network. They are the author of two books and numerous journal articles, book chapters, and other research publications. Sasha's most recent book, Design Justice: Community-Led Practices to Build the Worlds We Need, was published by the MIT Press and is available Open Access at https://design-justice.pubpub.org. Sasha is an Arts & Lectures Justice for All Visiting Scholar in residency hosted by Dr. Sharon Tettegah. "FROM POLICY TO PEDAGOGY" WITH DR. CANDACE COFIELD

Dr. Candace Cofield will be joining us to give her presentation "From Policy to Pedagogy: Reimagining Education Through a Black Liberatory Lens' Disrupting Anti-Blackness, Centering Healing, and Building Liberatory Public Schools" on May 12, 2025 at 12:00 p.m. in 4603 South Hall. Dr. Cofield will be examining the intersection of educational policy, pedagogy, and anti-Blackness through a liberatory framework grounded in both practice and scholarship. Positioned at the nexus of educational leadership, community engagement, and culturally sustaining pedagogy, this presentation highlights the possibil-

-ities and tensions of engaging in equity work within public school systems. Participants will consider how healing-centered, identity-affirming approaches can foster systemic transformation while holding space for Black brilliance, resistance, and joy.

"PREPARING ANTIRACIST EDUCATORS" WITH DR. KATRINA LIU

Dr. Katrina Liu will be giving her presentation "Preparing Anti-Racist Educators: Critical Reflection and Generatively for Transformative Praxis" on June 3, 2025 at 12:00 p.m. via Zoom. In this presentation, Dr. Liu will provide analysis of preservice teachers' habits of mind and patterns of acting in relation to race and racism. She will then provide a conceptual framework and detailed approaches teacher educators can implement to support preservice teachers to transform their reflections on race into actions against racism.



Dr. Liu is a member on the Center's Advisory Committee and an Associate Professor in the College of Education at the University of Nevada, Las Vegas. She earned her Ph.D. in Curriculum and Instruction from the University of Wisconsin-Madison with specializations in teacher education and educational leadership and policy analysis. We decided to take the time to be proactive by strategically planning for the work ahead, including account, process, role, and separation of duties changes inherent to using the new systems while closing out the current fiscal year using current accounts, processes, and roles. We have moved into phase two of our accounting shadow system and account cleanup, and we will begin to formalize our FAU account mapping to the new Common Chart of Accounts structure in April. We are sprinting to close out Concur Reports, UC Path suspense account transfers, Gateway purchases, and Summer Salary requests that should be processed earlier than previous years for this year's fiscal close. UPDATES FROM POSTDOCTORAL SCHOLAR CHARLES TERRY

Dr. Charles Terry is working with his research group consisting of three students: Zitong Xi, a senior majoring in Statistics Science. Maia Fuller, a junior double majoring in History of Public Policy and Law along with Film and Media Studies. Kamaya Jackson, a sophomore majoring in Black Studies. The group is meeting weekly and has begun writing a journal article examining the North Hall sit-in as part of the 1968 Black Student Movement here at UCSB. Additionally, Dr. Terry is finishing the implementation of peer review feedback into his book project entitled "A Rebellious Education: Slave Rebellions, Enslaved African Americans, and the Fight for Literacy". He has continued to attend events hosted by the UCSB Multicultural Center, the Office of Black Student Development, and the African diasporic Cultural Resource Center (AdCRC) including the Black Book Launch Luncheon. Lastly, Dr. Terry has applied to upcoming conferences including the University of Minnesota's Common Ground Consortium program.
