Thank you so much for providing your support for the Center for Black Studies Research.

We decided to send out a May/June newsletter to reduce the number of emails we usually send out. In recognition of last month, Mental Health Month (May) and this month, Pride Month (June), we are celebrating by combining both.

We have accomplished some amazing things over the last five years. From 2018-2019 through 2022-2023, we have sponsored and co-sponsored over 41 Black Studies' research focused presentations, workshops, and other programming, and 20 research presentations, lectures, and other programs that focus on People of Color, which include Indigenous/Native Americans, Black/African American, Latinx, Mexican, Chicanx, and Asian American.






Dr. Waverly Duck, North Hall Chair Endowed Professor of Sociology at UCSB, joined us to discuss his knowledge around interaction orders.


STAFF APPRECIATION
