WORKSHOP: HEALTHCARE UTILIZATION FRAMEWORK

This workshop is designed to equip participants with the skills to build and apply a healthcare utilization framework. We'll explore essential concepts, influential factors, and practical tools for designing frameworks that drive informed decision-making and policy development. Through hands-on exercises, participants will learn how to apply these insights to real-world healthcare settings to improve patient outcomes and optimize resources. Ideal for those interested in data-driven strategies to address healthcare challenges.

The goals of this workshop are: 1. Build a foundational understanding of healthcare utilization frameworks, 2. Analyze key factors that impact healthcare utilization, 3. Provide tools for designing frameworks to support policy and decision-making, and 4. Enable application of these frameworks across various healthcare contexts for enhanced outcomes.

Dr. Terry also attended the Austin Film Festival from October 24th to November 1st, where his script, *Mississippi Flood*, placed as a semifinalist. Additionally, he will be attending the History of Education Society (HES) Conference from November 7-10th, where he will be a panel participant and presenter. Dr. Terry's presentation will center around his paper, *A Rebellious Education: Enslaved African Americans and the Fight For Literacy*.

A Brighter Future for the Autism Community

A recent study published in Frontiers in Psychiatry has shed light on the specific health information needs of individuals with Autism Spectrum Disorder (ASD) in the post-COVID-19 era.

By analyzing discussions on the popular online forum known as Reddit, researchers, led by Dr. Ebenezer Larnyo, gained valuable insights into the challenges and concerns faced by the ASD community. The study employed a mixed-method approach, combining qualitative content analysis with machine learning techniques, including Bidirectional Long Short-Term Memory (Bi-LSTM) networks, to delve deeper into the emotional nuances and sentiment expressed within the online conversations.

Key themes emerged, including understanding the complexities of ASD and navigating the diagnostic process, the unique challenges and rewards of caring for an individual with ASD, and addressing the social stigma and discrimination often faced by the ASD community.

This groundbreaking research highlights the potential of digital platforms to provide tailored health information and support to the ASD community. By understanding their specific needs, we can develop innovative solutions to improve the quality of life for individuals with ASD and their families.
