## CBSR WELCOMES BLADIMIR CARABALI HINESTROZA POSTDOCTORAL SCHOLAR



Please join us in warmly welcoming Dr. Bladimir Carabali Hinestroza, who began his appointment as a Postdoctoral Scholar at UCSB's Center for Black Studies Research (CBSR) on January 8<sup>th</sup>.

Bladimir Carabali Hinestroza's work focuses on the study of inequalities affecting Afro-Colombian communities. His research examines the demographic impacts of the armed conflict, with particular attention to mortality patterns among Black populations on Colombia's Pacific Coast, a region shaped by long-standing social exclusion and state neglect.

His academic trajectory centers on analyzing ethnic-racial structures of inequality in relation to mortality, fertility, migration, access to health care, educational attainment, and labor market outcomes.

## UPDATE FROM POSTDOCTORAL SCHOLAR BRANDE OTIS



Brande Otis is advancing multiple lines of research.

She and AJ Rice, Assistant Professor of Political Science and Center for Black Studies Research Affiliate, have written a project for a Spencer Small Grant entitled, "The Politics of Takeovers: School Closures, State Takeover, and Black Resistance in Inglewood, CA."

This project examines the links between gentrification, Black dispossession, and education policy in Inglewood, CA, paying close attention to how school closures and state takeover policies are correlated, and how Black Inglewood makes sense of and responds to the local educational landscape.

She is continuing independent research and writing in Black childhood(s) and Black geographies of freedom and educational justice.
